Connection between Clan McLean and Napier

McLean or Maclean of Duart is the Red Tartan

Sir Donald McLean 1820 - 1877

The park is named in memory of Donald McLean who, as Native Minister and Government Land Commissioner, purchased a large block of land from local Maori in the early days of European settlement in this area.

Donald McLean spoke in English, Gaelic and Maori. Sir Donald died at the age of 56.

In 1905, a trust was formed to establish a memorial to Sir Donald McLean and to that end, ten acres was purchased for recreational purposes - the future McLean Park. In the early years, the Highland Society was very strong and the park was mainly used for highland games and athletic groups. The Caledonian Society gifted two days a year for their use. Sir Donald was the Member of Parliament for Napier from 1866 – 1877.

Sir Douglas McLean & Lady Florence - Only Son of Donald

The patronage of Sir Douglas McLean galvanised the decision to build the original HB Museum and Art Gallery.

Lady Florence gifted to the museum an extensive collection of artifacts, antiques and archives. Over 850 items were gifted to the museum from the McLean Family. Many items were of historical importance to Hawke's Bay.

Lady Florence and Sir Douglas - first president of the Napier Society of Arts & Crafts.

The McLean Gallery and HBMT'S collection of works by Horatio Robley, were also made possible by the generosity of the McLean Family.

In 1877, Douglas formed the Te Makarini Trust in memory of his father Donald. This income provides annually a series of scholarships for gifted students attending Te Aute College. Douglas and Florence lived on Maraekakaho Station.

They were also from Scotland and built Duart House in Havelock North, no relation to the other McLeans but Allan was called "Tuki" McLean as he had built his home on the banks of the Tuki Tuki River, and this nick-name was to distinguish him from the other family of the same name.

Just a few details of the McLean Family and their connection to Napier.

Health & Safety Update

Your Committee has been working hard throughout the year, focusing and improving the current Health & Safety regime. While there is no legal requirement to do so, the safety of members and visitors to the Band and its facilities is paramount.

There are now a number of documents approved relating to Health and Safety with those relevant to you pinned on the notice board at the Band Rooms.

Of particular note are:

- Monthly safety check on appliances, first aid stock etc. This will be managed by the Committee member on cleaning duty each month.
- An Incident and accident report which is to be completed in need. The Committee will then take necessary action to minimise any exposed risk for the future.
- There is also a formalised complaints process. Of course, while the hope is that this is not required, it does set out what steps to take if you feel bullied, harassed or unfairly treated in any way. The key here is to treat everyone with courtesy and respect.

For those of you who favour parking on the yellow lines at practice, please note you are asked to refrain from this, giving all members as much turning room as possible in the already tight parking bays.

Traditional Mallorcan music is unthinkable without the Xeremia (a bagpipe). Go to any village festa and you will hear them, together with small drums, flutes and tambours. The Mallorcan bagpipe is most likely a variation of an Islamic instrument, brought by the Moors a very long time ago. The bagpipes are very much in use on a regular basis, and are mostly played by young bearded men. As much as

Mallorca is a location with a rich tradition of musical schooling for both males and females, I have only seen one female playing a Xeremia in over twenty years.

The Xeremia player is called the *Xeremier* who will come in a formation with a small *flabiol* flautin and a compact *tamboril* drum, to be played by one and the same player. The photo was taken in Felanitx, Mallorca, Spain
