

My Piping History

I was attending the Napier Boys High open evening with my family the first time the idea of learning the pipes came up. I was a bit overwhelmed with all of the potential things I could do at a high school after spending my primary and intermediate school years at a small country school where the roll peaked at around 25 pupils, 3 of which were in the same year as me. My parents and I were talking about the subjects I'd take, when we heard the Boys High band playing and my Mum joked to me, "You could learn the pipes, too", although I didn't see it as a joke - I saw a challenge. So, once I started at Boys High, I met with Mr. Arrell and picked up a chanter and, with the help of Mr. Arrell and Ian Mansfeild, I was playing the pipes soon after. Once I had a few tunes off, I then started to attend practices on a Wednesday night with the Napier City Pipe Band. From there, Ian continued to tutor me and I entered into several solo competitions around the country, doing reasonably well. Upon finishing school, I decided I'd like to be a panelbeater, so I sent my CV to a lot of companies that specialized in classic car restoration (the part of the industry that interested me most) and to my surprise a few weeks later I received a phone call from a company in Matamata asking me if I'd like to come and work for them on a trial. So, I packed my bags and drove to the Waikato and 2 weeks later I signed my contract and had my first full time job. During my time in Matamata I didn't play with a band as such, although my Napier uniform still hung in my wardrobe at my parents place.

After 4 years, I decided to move back to Napier, where I quickly got a job as a panelbeater in a small company and it wasn't long before I was back playing in the band.

In 2013, along with Richard and Hugh, I joined the Drones and sticks pipe band. When we joined the two bands, we received a warm welcome and slotted into the rhythm of things quickly. Fast forward to the present day, I've just been elected to the committee, where I'm looking forward to serving the band into the future.

movement here in Hawke's Bay a group formed the Academy in 2013 with the objective of building piping and drumming education systems at Napier schools with consistent, quality teaching programmes and qualified tutors.

We have been supporting the activities of the Napier Pipe Band through the provision of

professional tutors for piping and drumming to augment the volunteer work of band members. A major focus in the next year will be further work to promote the objectives of the trust in schools so that there are regular numbers of young people learning the skills of piping and drumming in Napier.

In 2021 the Trust will be managing the RNZPBA national contest on behalf of the HB Caledonian and Napier pipe bands.

We have been fortunate that we have been able to build up some funds with

proceeds from various trusts (the Thomas Moore Trust, the Charlie Jennings Trust, the Services Trust (Napier), Harold Holt Trust and most recently The North & South Trust. We are very grateful to these organisations for their support of our objectives. In addition tuition fees and other donations have added to our reserves.

The Unicorn of Scotland

Unicorns are having a moment these days. But look behind the novelty shops, and you'll see it's not just a childhood toy or whimsical fancy-dress costume. The unicorn is, in fact, Scotland's national animal...if you can call it an animal.

Written depictions of unicorns go all the way back to ancient Babylonians and Celts, and as far back as the 12th century the unicorn was associated with nobility and

power in Scotland. Eventually it came to be seen as a symbol of Scotland's freedom-loving spirit and its hauntingly beautiful, wild nature.

Yet, like many other mythical beasts, danger lurks in the unicorn: too dangerous to be set free and impossible to capture, the unicorn is wrapped in chains in the Royal Coat of Arms of both Scotland and the United Kingdom.

Looking at Scotland's majestic landscapes and turbulent history, there's no better creature to represent this unique land and its bold people.

Magical Fairies

If you've been following the TV series *Outlander*, then you probably know that Highlanders had many superstitions surrounding fairies. Particularly on the Isle of Skye, the belief in the existence of fairies (also locally spelled *faeries*), or "the

little people," goes back to prehistoric times—although nowadays it's little more than a colourful part of the local legends. Originally thought to be evil, fairies were believed to live deep within the heather of **Fairy Glen.**

This bizarre landscape of supernaturally green, grassy knolls is a lovely spot for a walk on a nice day. And it goes without saying that fairies hate litter, so remember to clean up after yourself if you have a wee picnic here.

The Fairy Pools are another place associated with "the little people". Also located on Skye, near Glenbrittle at the foot of the Black Cuillins, this is



an idyllic spot for a walk the along rocky terrain, beside the bubbling stream, crystal-clear pools and little waterfalls — great photo opportunities all around. It is said that fairies bathe here in the cold pools, and brave visitors sometimes do as well!
