

Dave, who died in May, played with a number of bands including the Scottish Society in Christchurch, and here in the Bay with the Port Ahuriri, the HB Scottish and with the City of Napier pipe bands.

He held many positions in Napier's pipe bands including Pipe Sergeant, President and Custodian, and he and Val were made life members of the Band in recognition of the great contribution they made to the band over so many years.

Dave, an engineer at the now closed Whakatu freezing works, was a very practical man. He even set up a compressor to help blow in those hard McAllister reeds – however, he was caught out when the pipe major needed to alter one of his reeds and found engine oil on it.

He helped procure the Napier City Rovers club rooms on Nelson Park and transform it into the present hall which has served Napier's bands well

- the main hall is called the Mitchell Room in recognition of the work done by Dave and Val for the band.

When we think about Dave Mitchell the list of adjectives includes approachable, hard working, helpful, reliable, supportive, cheerful and kind.

We have been privileged to have shared our pipe band lives with Dave; we have been helped and supported by him and we are grateful that he shared his talents and gifts with us, something we will always remember.

HB's Pipe Band Contest

The 2021 national pipe band contest was hosted by The Piping & Drumming Academy of Hawke's Bay in collaboration with the HB Caledonian Pipe Band and the Napier Pipe Band.

While initially expressions of interest were received from fifty-four bands, including six from Australia, the final count of entries was 35 bands plus 12 juvenile bands. Numbers were affected by the ongoing pandemic situation which prevented the Australian bands, and others from overseas, from being involved. It also affected some NZ bands which were unable to schedule regular practices or had members unwilling to commit time and resources in the changing circumstances.



The final tally of numbers saw 838 pipers, drummers and drum majors compete with approximately one-third of these being 18 years of age or younger. Bands report an average of 3.5 bed nights in Hawke's Bay. The RNZPBA survey indicates that for every ten band members there were another 6 family and supporters accompanying the band, with one-third of all these being youngsters (18 years of age or younger).

A significant contribution was made to the event by the 50+ volunteers, Rotarians and the Scouts (plus others) who undertook catering for officials and volunteers, marshalling, crowd control, tent supply and

set up, supervision of car parking, driving and hosting officials and, of course, setting up and pack down of the grounds. We are very grateful for the support of all the volunteers.

Napier City Council and Hastings District Councils were major funders of the event enabling the Academy to proceed with planning even when circumstances changed over the two years. Eastern Institute of Technology came on board as principal sponsor for the live streaming of the contest.

We engaged with NZME to produce a newspaper supplement which was delivered to all HB Today subscribers on 11 March. Copies were also available (free) at the park for spectators and bands people. The objective of the supplement was to replace the traditional programme with a more widely available and more informative publication that would attract local interest. It was also ideal publicity for HB's pipe bands and we are grateful to the advertisers who supported this promotion.

A worldwide audience watched all grades and events via the livestream. The Friday Street March was also streamed via YouTube Live in a multi-camera production that rivalled that of BBC Scotland's broadcasts of the World Pipe Band Championships, complete with expert and intelligent commentary using plain language by experienced commentators. Over 40,000 people have viewed the live stream with 48% of these being overseas, a truly international audience.

The street march in Napier's CBD was watched by a large crowd with feedback indicating that the sight and sound of the bands marching, the uniforms worn by the bands, seeing the bands parading in Napier's Art Deco streets and the massed bands at the end were the things that attracted, and were enjoyed by, people.

A Have-A-Go tent was set up at the park with a variety of pipe band related things and this was staffed by knowledgeable people who were able to talk to young people. There were periods during the weekend where the tent was brimming with folks, both young and old, having a good time learning about pipes and drums.

We are pleased to advise that the contest has operated with a small financial surplus (which will be shared between the Academy and the RNZPBA). This result would not have been possible without the very generous support of the local Councils, businesses and trusts.



We are really grateful for everyone's support and hope that you managed to see some or all of the contest and to experience all the wonderful pipe bands.

Richard Loan - A Joyful Journey.

Piping has been part of my life since I was 11 years old. I love it for:

- ◆ The joy of a well-played tune on a fine-tuned instrument…entering the musical zone
- The comradeship
- The contesting, both solo and bands
- The frustration of reeds, both chanter and drones, especially the old cane reeds. They stop, and go out of tune easily. But oh such fun!
- The challenges of finding the right music for a band or for solo work and the ongoing practice to perfect it. That isn't always enjoyable!



Starting young

My tuition, along with that of my brothers, Bob and Iain, started at Scots College, Wellington with Alan Guild, the Pipe Major of the City of Wellington Pipe Band. The band had just returned from a successful World tour attending the World Pipe Band Champs in Scotland where they came 8th. They were the first NZ band to compete out of the country.

I played in the City of Wellington for 13 years under P/M Frank McKinnon who continued my tuition. This band won the NZ championships 15 times, a record which perhaps may never be equalled. We also went to the World Championships in the UK in 1975, coming 9th. The tour included playing in Scotland and Canada. On other trips to Australia we had the thrill of winning the Australasian Championships on two occasions.

On shifting to Napier I joined the City of Napier Pipe Band and became Pipe Major after Charlie Jennings was tragically killed in the Erebus disaster in 1979. The band was promoted to Grade 1 the following year and came 4th in that grade 2 years later. For me, a particular joy was our son Michael playing with the band before he joined the NZ Police Band during his university years. I found leading the City of Napier Pipe Band for over 30 years was a huge commitment but also such a privilege.

I transferred to the Drones and Sticks (later renamed Napier PB) in 2013 and have been Musical Director since Kerry's retirement.

Solo piping was always important for me and I feel it complements involvement in bands. I managed several placings in A Grade including a 2nd in the Gold Medal Piobaireachd.

Competing was an important area for me, but now I do enjoy having my summer's free. I barely knew they existed!

Anne, my wife, played an important role in my piping career. The demands of raising a family and of a busy medical practice meant that without her support it would not have been possible to compete or run a band.

I've discovered there is a sense of fulfilment that comes from commitment. At times in my life practising was not my first priority, but I look back with fond memories and a sense of enjoyment as well as community achievement.


The lady reached into her purse and pulled out a picture of her husband in bed with the pharmacist's wife.
